Further Notes

Ave Verum Corpus W. A. Mozart

Ave verum corpus, a motet, also in D major, was composed by Mozart in 1791 less than 6 months before his death. A setting of a 14th century Latin hymn, it was composed for the feast day of Corpus Christi for a friend who was the musical director of a church near Vienna.

Elements of the Mass (continued)

Gloria in excelsis (Glory to God in the highest)

This is often referred to as the "angelic hymn" as it is said to have first been sung by the angels in heaven as Jesus was born on earth. The first section is a joyful call to God the Father: "we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory." The hymn then moves to ask for the mercy of the Son, the Lamb of God, "who takes away the sins of the world". The final lines of the Gloria return to the more adorational tone of the beginning, referencing the Trinity of "Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father."

Credo (I believe)

The Credo is the longest text, its purpose being a statement of belief. The Nicene Creed is the most accepted statement of belief across the various traditions of the Christian faith including Roman Catholicism, Eastern Orthodox, much of Protestantism and Anglicanism. The statement includes firstly belief in God the Father who made all things. Second is belief in Jesus Christ as God's only son who became a man, being borne of the Virgin Mary, to save mankind. He was crucified, died, was buried and rose on the third day and sits in heaven with God the Father. He will return to judge the living and the dead. Third, is belief in the Holy Ghost, the Lord and Giver of Life, who spoke through the prophets. The Credo concludes with a statement of belief in the one Church, that sin will be forgiven through baptism, resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come.

Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy)

Benedictus (Blessed) with Hosanna (rejoice)

The Sanctus and Benedictus are sometimes considered separately. The Sanctus is a joyful acknowledgement of God's glory and power and an acclamation of thanks and praise to God: Hosanna! The Benedictus is a more restrained acknowledgement of the Son of God (Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord) but similarly ends with a joyful Hosanna!

Agnus Dei (Lamb of God)

The Agnus Dei is a prayer seeking Jesus' mercy and peace as the "Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world", as he was described by John the Baptist. The final part of the Mass in terms of a religious service is the dismissal by the priest "Ite, missa est" (go, the congregation is dismissed; or go, it is the dismissal). The word "Mass" is derived from this phrase.

The Chordiality Players

The Chordiality Players is a group of freelance musicians from around Brisbane who also play with the Queensland Symphony Orchestra, Queensland Pops Orchestra and the Camerata of St John's Chamber Orchestra. They are led by Sally-Anne Djachenko (1st violin), Allana Wales (2nd violin), Yuri Djachenko (viola), Gwyn Roberts (cello), and Marian Heckenberg (double bass).

Madeline Gibbs - Soprano

Madeline is a Brisbane-based soprano with a keen interest in solo vocal ensemble music. She completed a Bachelor of Music in vocal performance under the tutelage of Sarah Crane, graduating in 2014. Since then, Madeline has enjoyed exploring a wide variety of sacred, operatic and choral repertoire. She has performed as a soloist in St John's Cathedral and for local choirs in Brisbane and surrounds.

Eleanor Adeney - Alto

Eleanor graduated from the Queensland Conservatorium of Music with Honours in Advanced Performance on Classical Violin in 2017 and has enjoyed a busy freelance career as a violinist and choral singer in the UK and Australia. She is a regular member of the St Stephen's Cathedral Schola and is a founding member of the solo vocal ensemble *Lucis*. She has appeared as alto soloist for numerous orchestral and choral works.

Tom Holownia - Tenor

An Honours graduate of the Queensland Conservatorium of Music, Tomasz worked in professional choirs in the UK before returning to Australia. A published composer with Wirripang, Tomasz continues to have many of his choral works performed by various Australian ensembles. Tomasz is a Software Engineer by day, and a Singer, Composer, Organist and Conductor by night.

Tim Newton – Bass

Timothy Newton studied at the University of Melbourne prior to further studies in Italy and is presently a member of the Stupendiat at the Deutsche Oper Berlin. He is the recipient of the 2018 Opera Foundation for Young Australian's *Deutsche Oper Berlin* Award. He has sung and covered many principal operatic roles and is an experienced oratorio singer.

Programme Notes

"The Mass is an extraordinary musical form. Whereas other Western art music genres from medieval times have fallen out of favour, the Mass has not merely survived but flourished. Even as Western societies moved away from their Christian origins to become the religiously plural and politically secular societies of today, and the Church itself moved in favour of congregational singing, composers continued to compose masses." *Stephanie Rocke (2021)*. The music of the Mass can therefore be appreciated in both church service and concert contexts.

Schubert's *Mass in G Major* was composed in less than a week in 1815, when he was 18. It was written for, and likely performed in, the Lichtental (Vienna) parish church, where Schubert had been baptised and had sung as a choirboy. It was purportedly composed to impress one of the young sopranos in the choir!

Mozart's *Missa Brevis in D Major* was completed in 1774 when he was 18. As its name implies, it is a short Mass setting and is thought to have been composed for ordinary liturgical use in Salzburg Cathedral under the directive of Archbishop Colloredo and where Mozart was organist.

The final work in the set, the *Mass for All Saints'*, composed by our Music Director Brett Sturdy, is shorter again, being less than ten minutes in total. It provides a setting which pares the Mass to its bare essentials and does not include a sung Credo.

Elements of the Mass

Kyrie eleison (Lord have mercy)

The Kyrie is the only part of the Mass in Greek. Its use in the Western Mass dates from the 6th century while the Roman-based church was using Latin from the 4th century. It seems that due to its late inclusion, it remained in Greek rather than being translated. It is a simple, sung prayer, usually in the form: Lord have mercy; Christ have mercy; Lord have mercy.
